

TENSTEPS

TO SUCCESSFUL BREASTFEEDING

EVERY FACILITY PROVIDING MATERNITY SERVICES AND CARE FOR NEWBORN INFANTS SHOULD:

- a. Comply fully with the International Code of Marketing of Breast-milk Substitutes, relevant World Health Assembly resolutions, and the National Regulations of the Marketing of Infant and Young Children Foods and Other Designated Products in Nigeria.
 - **b.** Have a written infant feeding policy that is routinely communicated to staff and clients.
 - **c.** Establish ongoing monitoring and datamanagement systems.
- Ensure that staff members have sufficient knowledge, competence, and skills to support breastfeeding.
- Discuss the importance and management of breastfeeding with pregnant women and their families.
- Facilitate immediate and uninterrupted skinto-skin contact and support mothers to initiate breastfeeding immediately after clamping of the cord (within an hour of birth).

- Support mothers to initiate and maintain breastfeeding and manage common difficulties.
- Do not provide breastfed newborns any food or fluids other than breastmilk, unless medically indicated.
- Enable mothers and their infants to remain together and to practice rooming-in and bedding-in 24 hours a day.
- Support mothers to recognize and respond to their infants' cues for feeding and ensure the baby is fed on demand.
- Counsel mothers on the use and risks of feeding bottles, teats and pacifiers.
- Coordinate discharge so that parents and their infants have timely access to facility and community support and care.
